Spotlight: SOIS Alumna Running for ALA President



SOIS proudly highlights **Dr. Andrea Jamison** (**PhD '21, MLIS '08**), whose career encompasses roles in school, public, and academic libraries, reflecting her dedication to diversity, equity, and inclusion within the library and information science field.

Currently, Dr. Jamison serves as an assistant professor of school librarianship at Illinois State University in Normal, Illinois. Her scholarly work focuses on critical librarianship, representation in children's and young adult literature, and social justice in library practice. She has authored significant publications, including "Decentering Whiteness in Libraries: A Framework for Inclusive Collection Management Practices," contributing to the advancement of inclusive practices in libraries.

Dr. Jamison's leadership extends to her candidacy for the 2026–2027 presidency of the American Library Association (ALA). Her platform emphasizes countering assaults on intellectual freedom, reshaping narratives about libraries, and advocating for legislative protections for library workers. She is committed to supporting librarians dedicated to serving their communities, particularly in today's climate of censorship and social tension.

Her extensive involvement in professional organizations includes serving as a juror for the Coretta Scott King Book Awards Round Table, past chair of the Ethnic and Multicultural Information Exchange Round Table, and member of the Black Caucus of the ALA. Dr. Jamison's dedication to mentorship and advocacy for systemic change in library and information science education exemplifies the Dominican spirit of service, leadership, and commitment to social justice, inspiring our students and alumni alike.

In Memorium



Pauline Anna Blazina Atherton Cochrane (MALS '54), a distinguished SOIS alumna, passed away on July 29, 2024, at the age of 94. Born in Argo, Illinois, she earned her Master of Arts in Library Science from Rosary College (now Dominican University) in 1954, laying the foundation for a pioneering career in library and information science.

Cochrane was renowned for her groundbreaking work in subject access and information organization. Her research led to significant improvements in catalogs and indexes, enhancing the accessibility of information for users worldwide. She was instrumental in developing the first campus-based retrieval system for Psychological Abstracts and played a key role in advancing the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) Thesaurus.

Throughout her career, Cochrane held academic positions at institutions including Chicago Teachers College, Syracuse University, and the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. She served as president of the American Society for Information Science (ASIS) in 1971 and was honored with the ASIS Award of Merit in 1990. Her dedication to education was evident in her efforts to introduce computer-based cataloging and online reference courses in the 1960s and 1970s, mentoring countless students and early career researchers.

Beyond her professional achievements, Cochrane had a deep appreciation for music and nature, often expressing her observations through haiku poetry. She supported organizations such as the Smithsonian Chamber Music Society and the Oberlin Credo program, reflecting her commitment to nurturing young talent.

Pauline Cochrane's legacy as a visionary in library and information science continues to inspire, embodying the values of innovation and service that Dominican University cherishes.
